

Checklist for: East Lake/Paulina Lake/Crane Prairie/Lava Lake/Hosmer Lake/Three Creeks Lake

Important to note:

- 1) Please check your booking confirmation for accuracy on date, time and meeting place and let the shop know immediately if there are any errors or discrepancies. (541)549-3474
- 2) If you have any health conditions or allergies your guide will benefit knowing about, please call the shop so we can add that info to our booking notes. Note, all FFP guides are all trained in First Aid and CPR and can administer an epinephrine pin if you bring your own.
- 3) Refer to the trip cancellation policies if you might need to cancel or reschedule this trip.
- 4) Lunch and drinks are provided on all full day trips.
- 5) Conditions will dictate the final lake destination due to altitude and weather conditions providing a safe and comfortable trip.
- 6) Guide gratuity is always appreciated. General service guidelines are 20%+ for a good trip.

+ make sure to bring the following items with you:

Rain jacket and pants.

A warm layer like a puffy or sweatshirt.

Check the forecast for the mountains and add a stocking cap and gloves if inclement weather is possible.

Reusable water bottle! We do our best to kick plastic and never use single use bottles.

Sunscreen and lip balm.

Polarized Sunglasses with Amber Lenses.

A valid Oregon fishing license. Visit www.myodfw.com or the shop to purchase one.

We provide rods/reels/lines, flies and terminal tackle for our lake trips.

If you wish to bring your own rod a 9' or 10' four or five weight is often perfect for our local waters with a floating line. For sinking lines we recommend a five or six weight in 9 ½' to 10' lengths.

Hover, Intermediate, Type 3 and Type 5 sinking lines are most often used, but midge tips and type 7 and sweep lines are good at certain times.

4x, 5x and 6x fluorocarbon tippet are most often used.

There is no need for waders or boots on your lake trip.

Some of our smaller lakes don't have docks for boarding the boats, but we do our best to keep your feet dry as you enter and exit the boat on all trips.

On the bigger lakes, docks are usually present but subject to USFS schedules which don't necessarily coincide with the Oregon fishing season.

+Fly List:

Leeches and Balanced Leeches: Black, Black/Blue, Black/Red, Canadian Brown, Olive, Claret and Natural Grey all produce for us. There are days when a fluorescent orange bead seems to be the magic added to our leeches, but be prepared with darker beads too. Leech patterns run #6-14

Chironomids: Red, Black, Brown, Olive with various ribbing tones work well here. We tie our chironomids with white beads and with gun metal beads for different conditions. #12-20

Callibaetis: Nymphs, Emergers, Duns and Spinners. #14-18

Caenis: Duns and Spinners #22 mostly at Hosmer at dusk but occasionally seen at Crane Prairie in large summer hatches.

Long Horned Sedge: Purple Soft Hackle, Orange Soft Hackle, Black X Caddis, Black Elk Hair Caddis #14-18

Traveling Sedge: Stillwater Pupa, Tom Thumb, Goddard Caddis, Synthetic Sedge #6-10

Beetles #12-16

Ants: Black #10-18, Honey #16, Flying Ants for early summer #10-12, Flying Ants for late summer #16

Damsels: Nymphs and Adults #10-14

Dragonfly Nymphs #6-10

Waterboatman #14-18

Scuds #12-18 Colors range from tan and olive to gray.

Chub and other Baitfish streamers and balanced streamers #6-10

Blobs, Fabs and Boobies are occasionally used on our local lakes with success
